

Requirements for the Funeral Liturgy

Music

Please choose one hymn for

- *Entrance*
- *Preparation of the Gifts*
- *Exit from the Church*

Please also choose one or two hymns for *Communion*. Note that hymns to Our Lady can be sung at any time.

If you would like the *Responsorial Psalm* to be sung, please choose a suitable psalm.

At your request, the undertaker will arrange an organist for the Funeral Mass. Alternative musical arrangements should only be made after consultation with Fr Kevin Douglas.

We ask that you choose only **religious music** for the funeral liturgy. Please note that we do not have a PPL License and therefore cannot play any recorded music. *All music choices must be noted on the attached form and returned to Fr Kevin Douglas.*

Readings

This folder contains a selection of scripture readings which are appropriate for the funeral liturgy. Please choose at least two:

- *First Reading*
- *Responsorial Psalm*
- *Second Reading* (optional)

You may ask family members or friends to proclaim the readings. If this is not possible, please let us know and a parishioner will proclaim them. *All chosen readings must be noted on the attached form and returned to Fr Kevin Douglas.*

Offertory Procession

Two or more people can bring forward the gifts at the offertory procession. Please make sure the Priest knows how many people you would like in the procession by *filling in the attached form.*

Suggested Fees

The Church makes no charge for a funeral, however we would suggest the following points for your consideration:

- **Priest:** An offering is usually made to the priest who celebrates the funeral. This is a contribution towards his upkeep. The amount given varies according to your means.
- **Organist:** An offering is normally given to the organist. This should be £50.
- **Parish:** Although there is no fee for the church as such, if you do not normally come to Mass you may wish to make a contribution for the use of the church, heating and lighting etc. This should be put in a separate envelope from the priest's offering.

Reading 1

A reading from the book of Wisdom

3:1-9

The souls of the virtuous are in the hands of God,

A reading from the book of Wisdom

4:7-15

Reading 4

A reading from the second Book of Maccabees

12:43-45

Judas, the leader of the Jews, took up a collection among all the people individually, amounting to nearly two thousand drachmas, and sent it to Jerusalem to have a sacrifice for sin offered, an altogether fine and noble action, in which he took full account of the resurrection. For if he had not expected the fallen to rise again, it would have been superfluous and foolish to pray for the dead, whereas if he had in view the splendid recompense reserved for those who make a pious end, the thought was holy and devout. This is why he had this atonement sacrifice offered for the dead, so that they might be released from their sin.

First Reading from the New Testament
Within The Easter Season

Reading 1

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

10:34-36. 42-43

Peter addressed Cornelius and his household: 'The truth I have now come to realise,' he said, 'is that God does not have favourites, but that anybody of any nationality who fears God and does what is right is acceptable to him.' 'It is true, God sent his word to the people of Israel, and it was to them that the good news of peace was brought by Jesus Christ – but Jesus Christ is Lord of all men, and he has ordered us to proclaim this to his people and to tell them that God has appointed him to judge everyone, alive or dead. It is to him that all the prophets bear this witness: that all who believe in Jesus will have their sins forgiven through his name.'

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

14:13

I, John, heard a voice say to me, 'write down: Happy are those who die in the Lord! Happy indeed, the Spirit says; now they can rest for ever after their work, since their good deeds go with them.'

Responsorial Psalm

The response to the Psalm is: **Out of the depths I cry to you, O Lord**

Out of the depths I cry to you, O Lord: Lord, hear my voice!
O let your ears be attentive to the voice of my pleading. R.

If you, O Lord, should mark our guilt, Lord, who would survive?
But with you is found forgiveness: for this we revere you. R.

My soul is waiting for the Lord; I count on his word.
My soul is longing for the Lord more than the watchman for daybreak. R.

Because with the Lord there is mercy and fullness of redemption;
Israel indeed he will redeem from all its iniquity. R.

Reading 3

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

21:1-7

I John, saw a new heaven and a new earth: the first heaven and the first earth had disappeared now, and there was no longer any sea. I saw the holy city, and the new Jerusalem, coming down from God out of heaven, as beautiful as a bride all dressed for her husband. Then I heard a loud voice call from the throne, 'You see this city? Here God lives among men. He will his home among them; they shall be his people, and he will be their God; his name is God-with-them. He will wipe away all tears from their eyes; there will be no more death, and no more mourning or sadness. The world of the past has gone.'

Then the one sitting on the throne spoke, 'Now I am making the whole of creation new,' he said. 'I will give water from the well of life free to anybody who is thirsty; it is the rightful inheritance of the one who proves victorious; and I will be his God and he a son to me.'

Responsorial Psalm

The response to the Psalm is: **I rejoiced when I heard them say: "Let us go to God's house."**

I rejoiced when I heard them say:
"Let us go to God's house."
And now our feet are standing
within your gates, O Jerusalem. R.

Jerusalem is built as a city
strongly compact.
It is there that the tribes go up,
the tribes of the Lord. R.

For Israel's law it is,
there to praise the Lord's name.

Second Reading from the New Testament (Optional)

Reading 1

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

5:5-11

Hope is not deceptive, because the love of God has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit, which has been given us. We were still helpless when at his appointed moment Christ died for sinful men. It is not easy to die even for a good man – though of course for someone really worthy, a man might be prepared to die – but what proves that God loves us is that Christ died for us while we were still sinners. Having died to make us righteous, is it likely that he would now fail to save us from God's anger? When we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, we were still enemies; now that we have been reconciled, surely we may count on being saved by the life of his Son? Not merely because we have been reconciled but because we are filled with joyful trust in God, through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have already gained our reconciliation.

Reading 2

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

15:51-57

I will tell you something that has been secret: that we are not all going to die, but we shall all be changed. This will be instantaneous, in the twinkling of an eye, when the last trumpet sounds. It will sound, and the dead will be raised, imperishable, and we shall be changed as well, because our present perishable nature must put on imperishability and this mortal nature must put on immortality.

When this perishable nature has put on imperishability, and when this mortal nature has put on immortality, then the words of Scripture will come true: Death is swallowed up in victory. Death, where is your victory? Death, where is your sting? Now the sting of death is sin, and sin gets its power from the Law. So let us thank God for giving us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

Reading 3

A reading from the second letter of Paul to the Corinthians

4:14 – 5:1

We know that he who raised the Lord Jesus to life will raise us with Jesus in our turn, and put us by his side and you with us. You see, all this is for your benefit, so that the more grace is multiplied among people, the more thanksgiving there will be, to the glory of God.

That is why there is no weakening on our part, and instead, though this outer human form of ours may be falling into decay, the inner person is renewed day by day. Yes, the troubles which are soon over, though they weigh little, train us for the carrying of a weight of eternal glory which is out of all proportion to them. And so we have no eyes for things that are visible, but only for things that are invisible; for visible things last only for a time, and the invisible things are eternal.

For we know that when the tent that we live in on earth is folded up, there is a house built by God for us, an everlasting home not made by human hands, in heavens.

Reading 4

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians

4:13-18

We want you to be quite certain, brothers, about those who have died, to make sure that you do not grieve about them, like the other people who have no hope. We believe that Jesus died and rose again, and that it will be the same for those who have died in Jesus: God will bring them with him. We can tell you this from the Lord's own teaching, that any of us who are left alive until the Lord's coming will not have any advantage over those who have died. At the trumpet of God, the voice of the archangel will call out the command and the Lord himself will come down from heaven; those who have died in Christ will be the first to rise, and then those of us who are still alive will be taken up in the clouds, together with them, to meet the Lord in the air. So we shall stay with the Lord for ever. With such thoughts as these you should comfort one another.

Reading 5

A reading from the first letter of St John

3:1-2

Think of the love that the Father has lavished on us, by letting us be called God's children; and that is what we are. Because the world refused to acknowledge him, therefore it does not acknowledge us. My dear people, we are already the children of God but what we are to be in the future has not yet been revealed; all we know is, that when it is revealed we shall be like him because we shall see him as he really is.
